'Happy to be accepted back on to the council in a new role and look forward to representing all new consultants – get in contact if you have any questions.'

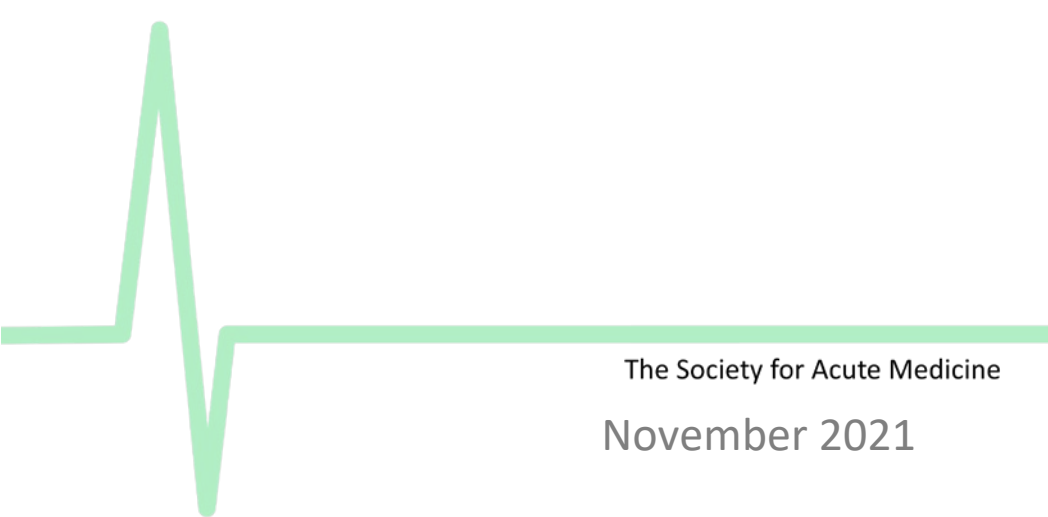
Webinars

Liz will commence a new role as Associate Professor of Nursing with Coventry University on 4th October. This is a jointly appointed role, where she will join a brand new multiprofessional team of 6 clinical academics, in the Centre for Care Excellence at University Hospital Coventry and Warwickshire. Liz completed her PhD with the NIHR in 2018 and plans to continue her international research regarding patient discharge from hospital and developing capability and capacity to undertake research for nurses in clinical roles.



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Liz is currently supervising a nurse undertaking a PhD (with international funding) on the topic of Sepsis (recognition and service transformation in lower middle income countries) now in her 2nd year of a 4 year programme.

Liz has supported 2 applicants to secure Pre-Doctoral Academic Fellowships (2021), they aim to apply for NIHR Clinical Doctoral Fellowships in 2022/2023.

Liz presents her research on patient discharge and knowledge translation in practice at the RCN International Research Conference

End of life Care Research – get involved!

A new research project, called Improving Implementation of NICE Recommendations on Planning Treatment and Care Towards the End of Life, seeks to address a key problem: that **many people nearing the end of their lives are not consulted on their preferences for treatment and care towards the end of life**. This can result in less personalised care and poorer experiences for individuals, their families and carers. The study will try to improve the quality of end-of-life care planning by learning from the views and experiences of a wide range of people.

Presidential Update

Dear Friends

It has been a month since I have had the privilege and honour of taking over as President of SAM. I hope to build upon the fantastic work that Dr Sue Crossland has done over the last two years and that of all the eminent previous holders of the role that have helped to establish the reputation and position of our fantastic specialty.

A reasoned and cogent reflection of the impact of Acute Medicine over the last decade necessitates a conclusion that much has been achieved and the infrastructure is in place to ensure future innovative, high quality and adaptive acute medical care. Early international adopters of the specialty demonstrate its increasing traction. A vision of how the struggling UK acute care sector would have survived without Acute Medicine, Acute Medical Units and the “front door” models led by the specialty is not appealing. The huge contribution, tremendous work and, tragically in some cases sacrifices, of Acute Medicine teams during the COVID pandemic was essential. As a specialty we should and must remain proud of the impact we had in its management.



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Predictions for the urgent and emergency care system in the upcoming months are difficult. There will be challenges: there always are and that to a degree is what makes working in acute care so fulfilling. However, even the most adaptive and innovative acute care systems will toil when these challenges become overwhelming. There is an escalating sense of desperation to reach a post-pandemic phase.

Delivering acute medical care on the background of the post-pandemic challenges alongside workforce and a “perfect storm” of other issues is one that none of us have faced. The skills and resilience of our teams will face its sternest test yet. As a Specialty we will continue to do what we have always done since its inception: evolve, adapt, innovate and deliver.

SAM will continue to try to support these priorities and play its part in the continued growth, development and evolution of our fabulous Specialty. We need yourselves as our friends, colleagues and members to support us to ensure this is achieved. We recognise the need to increase participation within the Society.

There are many exciting research and QI projects being developed nationally within Acute Medicine. The opportunities for SAM members to get involved in this work will be plentiful in the next year so please get involved. Please encourage any budding Acute Medicine researchers to apply for one of our SAM research grants.

Data to quantify the challenges that our Acute Medicine teams face are essential. SAMBA continues to deliver powerful and important data. The team have been working hard to progress SAMBA and we are hoping that colleagues will support our Acute Medicine SITREP where we will ask teams to collect 3 key indicators of Acute Medicine performance pressure:-

1. Is your AEC/SDEC unit bedded down?
2. How many empty beds are there on the AMU? (at 0900)
3. How many patients are currently in the ED waiting for a bed on the AMU? (at 0900)

SAM currently has research, education and QI subcommittees. We are hoping to expand our subcommittees to both facilitate easier member involvement within the Society but also drive important areas within the Specialty, drive future projects and help liaison with other Specialty societies. These may include SDEC, Frailty, Stroke, Maternal Medicine, Palliative Care, Acute Oncology and any that a group of our members would like us to consider establishing. Please get in touch if you are keen to lead in the development of any of these.

I hope to have regular Zoom calls for members to propose suggestions, raise concerns and ask questions regarding the work of SAM. Please feel free to email me at any time at President@acutemedicine.org.uk. I promise to always respond to all emails (even if that not as quickly as I would like).



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Once again, SAM thanks all colleagues for their amazing and diligent work which makes us a society and Specialty so proud. The next few months will be remarkably tough but Acute Medicine continues to make a huge difference. Thank you.
